- **4. Risk Management:** RACMA calls for national cybersecurity standards and investment in system resilience to mitigate risks such as data breaches and operational failures.
- **5. Clinical Practice:** RACMA advocates for evidence-based evaluation of digital tools to ensure they enhance clinical workflows without undermining clinician autonomy.
